






At the top

A warm welcome to the Moselle, Saar und Ruwer ... a countryside of superlatives awaiting your visit! It is here that winegrowers produce top international wines, it is here that the Romans founded the oldest city of Germany, it is here that you will find one of the most successful combinations of rich, ancient culture and countryside, which is sometimes gentle and sometimes spectacular. As far as the art of living is concerned, the proximity to France and Luxembourg inspires not only the cuisine of the Moselle region. There is hardly any other holiday region that has so many fascinating facets.



INSIDE GERMANY the Moselle has cut its way through deep gorges and countless meanders into the mountains over a distance of more than 240 kilometres, until it meets Father Rhine in Koblenz. Europe's steepest vineyard, the Bremmer Calmont, with a 68° slope, is situated in the largest enclosed area of cliffs in the world: roughly half of the Moselle vineyards, comprising around 10,000 hectares in total, are cultivated in this way, which demands a lot of

care and manual work. A winegrower must not suffer from vertigo here! The steep slopes and terraces, with their mild micro-climate and slate ground that stores the heat, are the ideal conditions for the Riesling grape, which produces the uniquely delicate fruity and tangy wines along the Moselle, Saar and Ruwer. The dry Moselle wines, in particular, that are cultivated by the 5000 or so winegrowers, with a wealth of individual nuances, are an excellent accompaniment to



delicate dishes. Their superiorquality, sweet "relatives"- which go well, for example, with the dessert, cheese or cigar – have also found a loyal following amongst connoisseurs.

Experienced wine writers put the Moselle-Saar-Ruwer region amongst one of the top locations: of the 100 best German wine estates, 30 come from the Moselle. However, it is not only Riesling, which made the Moselle famous, that is pressed here. Fresh and uncomplicated

Elbling grows on the shell limestone soils along the Upper Moselle, the fruity dry Rivaner and increasingly also white Burgundy and Burgundy gris wines are being cultivated. Red wines, especially the late Burgundies and Dornfelder, complete the extensive range of the winegrowers. The large variety of aromas of the Moselle wines, with their moderate alcohol content, never detracts from the enjoyment of them – a pure pleasure of discovery for wine buffs. From first class

restaurants to proper "Strauß-wirtschaften" [wine-bars selling new wines], you will find a Mediterranean joie de vivre in the traditional wine villages and towns to suit every taste, whether your preference is for an earthy, comfortable, family atmosphere or for something more refined in a sophisticated ambience. The Romans, who introduced the vines to the Moselle 2000 years ago, laid the foundations for the hearty and merry hospitality associated with wine.


and geology and wine, the history of the Moselle countryside and the techniques and finesses of wine cultivation are subjects, which you will be familiarised with through a multitude of experiences.





well preserved - from the elegant villa rustica through the amphitheatre, thermal springs and temples to wine presses, sculptures and monuments. The Roman buildings of Trier form part of the UNESCO world cultural heritage. Yet architectural history also has more recent treasures to offer: such famous buildings as castles from the Middle Ages, like Burg Eltz or the Cochem Reichsburg, Baroque half-timber façade houses as are found in Bernkastel and many other towns along the Moselle, seemingly playful "Jugendstil" buildings, especially in Traben-Trarbach, where the joie de vivre of the Moselle region is particularly well expressed.

Trier, as the metropolis of the Moselle region, offers a vast range of cultural high points, such as the classical festival, which stages classical material in a modern setting. And then there are the successful series of events like the "Mosel-Festwochen" – the largest classical music festival in the

Rhineland-Palatinate that has been staged over the last 15 years. All these events embrace the region as a whole.

Monasteries, wine cellars and castles are majestic backdrops for numerous music and theatre productions, exhibitions of plastic arts, poetry readings, cabaret or literary wine tastings. Everything associated with culture is at home in the Moselle region, ranging from the afterwork party in town through lounge music to traditional costume events in the wine village.

The intellectual heritage of the Moselle region is also famous: the famous philosopher, Nikolaus von Kues, and Karl Marx, the lateral thinker of great consequence, stand, throughout the world, as representatives of change in their particular historical epoch. For religious people, the region is a focus: Trier cathedral is the oldest church north of the Alps; the Holy Rock still attracts thousands of pilgrims and the bones of the St. Matthew the Apostle are kept as relics in Trier.








But other sports lovers also get their money's worth out of the Moselle: golfers and para-gliders, fans of water skiing and oarsmen, anglers and parachute jumpers ... as far as sport is concerned, almost anything is possible. Wine trails or the Moselle ridge path, on both sides of the river, entice hikers to explore the landscape on foot. Baths and hot springs enthuse swimmers and at the same time are an eldorado for people, who want to do themselves good. Wellness is written in block capitals here, particularly in Traben-

Trarbach/Bad Wildstein and Bad Bertrich, Germany's only Glauber's salt thermal spring, the natural warmth of which caters for your health in a side valley of the Moselle. Many first class hotels in the Moselle region offer wellness and beauty programmes for demanding customers.

The classical method to make progress in the Moselle region, is, of course, a trip on one of the elegant ships of the "White Fleet".

Round trips, dance cruises, day or half-day excursions or, as a parti-

cular highlight, a trip at dusk are the chosen form of transport from Easter to the end of October, to get to know the Moselle region, whilst at the same time exercising by doing sweet nothing. Nothing is more relaxing than being transported over water to the gentle chugging of the engines, whilst enjoying a few drinks of vintage wine and some fine food.





Wine buffs and those who enjoy wine can take WINE TASTINGS the four wine routes through the wine-growing

The Moselle-Saar-Rower wine travel guide will show you the way to the individual wine-growing villages and the routes where you can learn about wine; it names the winegrowers' co-operatives, which offer wine tasting and guided tours of the wine cellars and vineyards, not forgetting the wine seminars! The wine experience guide offers a tour of the countryside, thereby providing with experience and useful information all about wine. Information on wine tasting and the numerous wine festivals are also available from local tourist information offices.

An official seal will help you choose the right wine with your meal. The "Bester Schoppen" award guides the visitor to a tasty glass of wine.

WEIN&GOURMET FESTIVAL

Delightful discoveries await you in cosy wine bars selling new wine, in modern wine bars and fine restaurants in the Moselle and neighbouring regions. The diversity of the wines of the Moselle, Saar and Ruwer regions makes them ideal accompaniments to local and international cuisine. This is particularly clearly demonstrated at the Wein&Gourmet Festival, which Mosel-Saar-Ruwer Wein e.V. and the Moselle regional tourist board organise every year. Winegrowers, chefs and artists combine wine, cuisine and culture with more than 100 events, providing a pleasure for all the senses. The spectrum ranges from culinary wine tastings to excellent gourmet means right to the glittering gala evening in a historical setting.

CYCLING AND IN-LINE SKATING An extensive and level cycling route network runs from the German-French border at Perl along the Upper Moselle via Tries and along the central and terraced Moselle right to Koblenz. Ii you want, you can already start from Thionville in France (VeloTour Moselle), Cycle touring routes where the three countries [Germany, France and Luxembourg) meet provide endless cycling pleasure. Circular tours and day trips by bicycle can be undertaken from any holiday resort in the Moselle region. Even mountain bike riders get their money's worth along the Moselle and Saar. The extensive cycling route network is also eminently suitable for in-line skating.

CYCLING EVENT DAYS Several times a year, cyclists in the Moselle region have absolute priority, when normal roads are declared wide cycling tracks. One cycling event day full of superlatives is the "Happy Moselle" where the longest stretch of road in Europe is barred to traffic. Other events include: "Saarpedal", "Ruwertal aktiv", "Kylital aktiv" and "Summer Biking in the Nims- and Sauerial"

Countless hiking routes take the walker through diverse countryside - through river HIKING valleys and up onto the tops of vineyards, through narrow and wild gorges,

dense forests and through colourful orchards. What is unique is the "Moselle ridge path", that traces the steps of the Romans over 390 km on both sides of the Moselle. Even Alpine mountaineering is on the cards: Europe's steepest vineyard can many's can als

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

FUN IN THE WATER AND BOAT TRIPS Sailing, surfing, water-skiing - our rivers provide you with many ways to enjoy the summer. from wake boarding and introductory diving courses, to rowing and paddling on the Moselle, Saar and Sauer rivers. How about a sailing trip

from Koblenz right to the border with France at Perl? There are several yacht marinas and boat moorings along the Moselle and Saar and sailing boats, canoes and kayaks can be hired, as well as motor boats with or without



An up-to-date and detailed passenger boat licence requirement. timetable, containing the offers of the "White Fleet for the Moselle and Sear, can be obtained from the Moselle regional tourist board.

Gentle gliding on the warm air currents of the HIGH IN THE AIR river valleys of the Moselle and Saar: the particular thermals make the Moselle region not only one of the most important wine growing areas, but also a paradise for hang gliders and paragliders. If you want, you can also observe the picturesque meandering river from the bird's eye view of a hot air balloon or a glider. Round trips by air and charter flights are also available in motorised aircraft.

EVENTS AND FESTIVALS Fancy a bit of culture? The Moselle region has several highlights to offer: for example, the largest music festival in the Rhineland Palatinate, the Moselle festival, with around 60 concerts a year along the Moselle and Saar. The secret of its success is the unusual events with out-

standing musicians and sokrists in special surroundings. Every summer, the classical festival in Trier livens up the imposing UNESCO world cultural heritage of the town with classical subjects in all their magnificence. Lovers of organ music should not miss the series of concerts on historical organs in our impressive churches. Keyboard magic can also be witnessed at the International Summer Piano Festival in Bad Bertrich, However, culture in the Moseille region is not only of a classical nature. Events against a historical backdrop are available for all tastes, including jazz, rock and open air cinema. Trier was once a Roman metropolis and the seat of the Emperor Caesar Constantine, Many im-SIGHTS posing buildings from this period are still preserved - not only in Trier. The surrounding area, with its Roman villas, temples and monuments, the wine presses and water mains network also testify to the wealth of the Roman province.


The Middle Ages come to life, particularly in the knights' castles, which tringe the courses of the rivers Moselle, Saar and Ruwer. Towns and villages are marked by their exceptional architecture: from the

Romantic, Gothic and Renaissance periods in churches cloisters, early Baroque in the form of Moselle-Franconian balftimbered hous-Baroque, as wit-

nessed in the electoral buildings. In addition to this, the last two centuries produced impressive architecture. A trip along the Moselle, Saat and Ruwer is always a journey back in time.

People wishing to delve even deeper in the treasure chest of history can visit the numerous museums. There is a broad spectrum of wine museums and museums of local history in the Moselle region, ranging from open-air museums to the collections of precious Roman andings, as well as Christian and urban art and cultural treasures.
